

Wall of Mirrors - Program Note

Wall of Mirrors was commissioned by Harvard Glee Club and conductor Andrew Clark for their Spring 2020 concert and Midwest Concert Tour.

In conceiving the piece, Andy and I reflected on our shared hometown of Pittsburgh, PA, and decided to base the work off the life and teachings of Fred Rogers. Mr. Rogers is of course a legendary figure, and we wanted to feature his teachings on humility, kindness, and rethinking strength and masculinity, specifically in contemporary society and in writing for men's choir. I thus engaged my frequent collaborator Marco Grosse to write original text, sourcing several of Mr. Rogers's lyrics along with the Won't You Be My Neighbor? documentary and A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood film. Through such we hope to highlight how Mr. Rogers's teachings not only apply to children but also adults, in teaching humility, fragility, and humanity.

From Marco Grosse:

Memories can be very tricky. When I was first asked to write a text concerning Mr. Rogers I didn't know what it was about at all. Who was Mr. Rogers? What did he do to be spotted in such a way? Why him exactly? I started searching for information and got familiar with an astonishing personality. The deeper I got into his work, the more fascinated I was by the truth and honesty which he was showing in his behavior. This was a man who really believed in the values he was telling and teaching. And in my memory something came back. The sensation didn't leave me that I knew him from my childhood, when I lived in Canada and saw my first TV transmissions. I cannot tell if it's true, if my imagination created this familiarity due to the strong impression he made on me. But, in any case it was a confirmation of the universality of his belief and of my intention to write a text about this unusual man.
